

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"I don't know what I would do without MS Kidney Foundation. There are so few resources out there for our dialysis patients. At least half of my patients are trying to live on less than \$1000.00 a month. Some of them live 20 to 30 miles from the unit and must provide their own transportation to dialysis, three times a week. In addition, they have frequent doctors visits, vascular access, and most of the doctors and the hospital are 40 miles from their home, some more than 60 miles. Medication prices continue to go up and there are fewer and fewer patient assistance programs for the expensive binders they take. Early stages have no symptoms; thus, education and awareness are crucial to preventing the disease and slowing its progression. Chronic kidney disease can be hereditary.

What is the Best Way to Keep Your Kidneys Healthy? (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention)

Keep your blood pressure below 140/90, or ask your doctor what the best blood pressure target is for you.

2 Stay in your target cholesterol range.

3 Eat foods lower in salt. 5 Stay active.

4 Eat more fruits and vegetables. 6 Take your medications as directed.

Who is More Likely to Develop Kidney Disease? (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention)



Approximately 1 of 3 adults with diabetes and 1 of 5 adults with high blood pressure may have CKD.



In addition to diabetes and high blood pressure, other problems that put you at greater chance of kidney disease include: heart disease, obesity, and a family history of CKD. Kidney infections and a physical injury can also cause kidney disease.

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Facts About End Stage Renal Disease (Center for Disease Control)

2014

In 2014, 118,000 people in the United States started treatment for ESRD, and 662,000 were living on chronic dialysis or with a kidney disease. Men

Men are 64% more likely than women to develop ESRD.

Hispanics

Hispanics are 35% more likely than non-Hispanics to develop ESRD. Adults

In US adults aged 18 years or older, the main reported causes of new cases of ESRD are diabetes and high blood pressure. Adolescents

In US adolescents aged 13 to 17 years, the main reported cause of new cases of ESRD is glomerulonephritis (inflammation of the kidneys).



Meeting the Needs of Kidney Patients

The Mississippi Kidney Foundation works directly with medical professionals to help identify patient crises. The MKF works with over 60 renal social workers and 50 renal dietitians at 80 dialysis units across the state



to assess the needs and dietary assistance of patients on dialysis. Assistance is provided by MKF to patients for medications, transportation, utilities and much more, on a case by case basis.

MKF's GED program assists patients in finding free GED classes and provides a stipend for further schooling or job-hunting expenses once the patient passes the exam.



REAP and Awareness

The Renal Evaluation and Assessment Program (REAP) is designed to target those at risk for kidney disease through free

screenings. Using StatSensors, the level of kidney function is determined in thirty seconds by a simple finger prick. Screenings are held throughout the state at health fairs,

In 2018-2019, MKF hosted over 70 free screenings for kidney disease. 3,756 individuals were tested, and approximately 13.6% of those screened had abnormal kidney function of varying degrees. The screenings were held across Mississippi in nearly 25 counties and in more than 30 different cities.

"The MS Kidney Foundation has helped me to solve transportation, prescription, and various resource issues that we have at our clinic. It has been helpful because Natchez has limited resources, and the Kidney Foundation is always able to help find a solution for our patients. These patients are already in a vulnerable state dealing with kidney disease;

employee wellness checks, and community gatherings. With over 7,000 individuals screened since 2016, an average of 10% of participants have abnormal kidney function.

A wide variety of awareness and prevention literature is readily available upon request, including the Jerry Rice "I'm a Kidney Fan" fans. Mr. Rice, who has family ties to kidney disease and Mississippi, serves as a spokesperson in the effort to spread awareness.

Kidney patients and their families enjoy several events, sponsored by MKF, throughout the year.

MKF partners with Mississippi Blood Services, Mississippi Organ Recovery Agency (MORA), and the UMMC University Transplant Department in a variety of ways to promote organ donation and support those going through the transplant process.

Patient Conferences


Patient conferences are held periodically for both patients and their family members/caregivers. Conferences are conducted across Mississippi.

Pediatric Nephrology Holiday Party

The Pediatric Nephrology Holiday Party is held annually in December. Pediatric nephrology patients and their family members are invited to attend the



party. Lunch is free of charge, and Santa usually makes a visit!

This year's Holiday Party was held on December 11 at the University of Mississippi Medical Center's Student Union. Over 20 pediatric nephrology patients attended the party with family members. Each pediatric nephrology patient received a Wal-Mart gift card. The patients and their families enjoyed Newk's boxed lunches and had a great time decorating sugar cookies, dancing to holiday music and spending time with Santa and Mrs. Claus.



The \$10,000 Uptown Drawdown

The \$10,000 Uptown Drawdown is MKF's largest annual fundraising event with an average attendance of 500. It is a black-tie optional cocktail and hors d'oeuvre style reception with live music and a silent auction. The silent auction features an extensive collection of original art-



works. The proceeds raised at the gala support the mission of MKF and stay in the state to aid Mississippians.

Michael Rubenstein Memorial Kidney Walk

The Michael Rubenstein Memorial Kidney Walk is a 5K walk, typically held in early fall in Jackson. It is dedicated to the memory of fellow Mississippian Michael Rubenstein, who was a kidney transplant recipient.

The 2018 Michael Rubenstein Memorial Kidney Walk was held on October 6 throughout the Fondren Neighborhood in Jackson, Miss. There were over 300 participants. Sponsors of the Kidney Walk were Babalu, Fleet Feet, Fondren Fro-yo, Fondren Presbyterian Church, Mantle.City Club, McDade's Fondren, Sneaky Beans, St. James' Episcopal Church and Trustmark.

Registrants of the walk were encouraged to raise or donate \$50 in order to participate in the walk. Donations could be designated for a specific dialysis unit or for MKF's free kidney screenings. Each participant who raised \$100 or more was entered in a raffle to win \$1,000 at the end of the walk.

The 2019 Michael Rubenstein Memorial Kidney Walk will be held on September 28 in the Fondren neighborhood, in Jackson, Mississippi.

Kidney Kars Program
